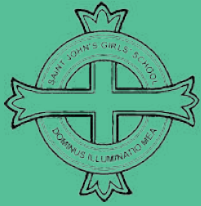

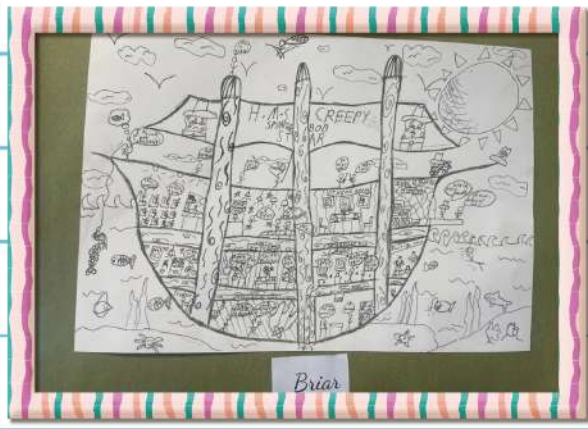
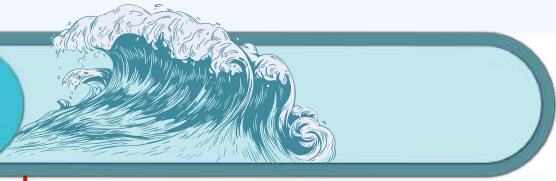
# Room 4
